allows people to say what they think. When everyone has had their say, the members vote and parliament takes a decision.

How can minority groups be represented if nobody will speak on their behalf? Parliament is about giving everyone - including men, women and children -

We all have the right

to our own opinions. We all have the right to be treated fairly and equally. That

is exactly why we need a parliament – parliament

is the meaning of democracy.

The government,
and not parliament, is responsible
for doing those things. Parliament is
there to act as your voice, and to speak to the
government about what is needed. So you should
make sure that it knows what the problems are.

Government can be national, regional or local, and some things are the responsibility of local or state government. If so, your local town councillor or member of state parliament might be able to help.

These people are like members of parliament except that they work only in your local area.

To have your say, you can write to your member of parliament.
When you're old enough, you could join the

youth group of a political party. Get involved

in your community and be an advocate

WHAT IS DEMOCRACY?

Democracy means that everyone in

the country has a say in deciding who will be in charge of the government. Democracy aims to protect our fundamental rights and freedoms. Those who are old enough vote to choose a group of people to be their voice in government, to speak to the government on their behalf and to make laws. That small group that people have voted for are the members of parliament. We expect those men and women to listen to the people and to do their job well and

Once every few years people get to choose again. They can decide to pick the same men and women to be members of parliament, or they can choose new ones.

The government are the people whose job it is to manage the country and provide things that we all need such as schools, hospitals, roads and police.

The government needs the support of the members of parliament. The leaders of government have to listen to what members of parliament tell them. If citizens do not like what the people in government do, citizens could vote them out and replace them with others.

> **AND WHAT IS PARLIAMENT?**

are rules that everyone must obey. These laws must be fair for everyone. They set out how we should do things and they help us live in peace with one another.

Most countries also have one "big law", called the Constitution. That is a basic law that says how our government and our parliament work. It even lays down how parliament makes other laws.

It is important that parliament also speaks with the voice of all the people. This means that it is we who decide, through parliament, what our laws are going to be.

BUT WHAT IS THE GOVERNMENT?

Parliament is the place where members of parliament speak to the government and let it know what people are thinking. Parliament is also the place that makes laws. It keeps an eye on what the government is doing. The members of parliament stay in touch with the people, and tell the government what people want.

SO WHAT

ARE LAWS?

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WHY SHOULD I BE **INTERESTED IN PARLIAMENT?**

Without a parliament, people would not have a say in how their country is run. The government would not have to listen to what the people want.

Also, parliament is a place where important issues affecting the country are discussed and where decisions are made about them.

WHAT SHOULD

PARLIAMENT DO

FOR ME?

Members of parliament are there to speak to the government about the things that people in the country are concerned about. You should expect your parliament and its members to -

- listen to what people are saying;
- let everyone know what they are doing, and not keep their work a secret;
- make it easy for people to write to them, visit parliament and talk about the things that concern
- work hard, do their best and be honest.

Members of parliament speak on behalf of different groups of people. Sometimes one group wants one thing but another wants something else. Not everyone agrees all the time and in that way parliament reflects the different views in society. In a democratic society people respect the right to free speech and tolerate the opinions

of others.

Members have to be polite to each other, and they must speak about the subject that is being discussed. As long as they do that, they must be allowed to give their point of view even if other members disagree totally.
