### Information note

#### Overview

This questionnaire forms part of a survey on the representation of minorities and indigenous peoples in parliament that is being conducted by the Inter-Parliamentary Union and the United Nations Development Programme.

The purpose of this survey is to gather quantitative and qualitative information on the ways in which members of minorities and indigenous groups become parliamentarians and how parliaments include these groups in their work. The information gathered will be analysed to provide insights into parliament as an institution that is inclusive of the social diversity of the population. Responses will be entered into a publicly available online database.

You are invited to complete this questionnaire on behalf of your parliamentary group. Separate questionnaires are being addressed to parliaments (Part A) and individual parliamentarians (Part C).

#### **Definition of 'Parliamentary groups'**

For the purposes of this questionnaire, 'Parliamentary group' (also known as 'Parliamentary party'; 'Parliamentary faction') refers to the representation of a political party or a coalition of parties or independent members in a parliament for particular purposes such as voting together. In many countries, the only way that parties and parliamentarians can receive financial and personal support and can join parliamentary committees is by organizing themselves in parliamentary groups.

#### Options for completing the survey

- 1. Electronic format (preferred option)
  - Download the questionnaire from <a href="http://www.ipu.org/minorities-e">http://www.ipu.org/minorities-e</a>. The questionnaire is available as a PDF file in English, French and Spanish. You can save your responses in the PDF file and return to complete the questionnaire later. When you have finished, click the 'Send the questionnaire to IPU' button at the end of the questionnaire. This generates an e-mail with an attached data file that contains your responses. Alternatively, you can send the PDF file by e-mail to <a href="mailto:postbox@mail.ipu.org">postbox@mail.ipu.org</a>.
  - You will need Adobe Reader (formerly called Acrobat Reader) to view and complete the
    questionnaire. Adobe Reader is already installed on millions of computers around the
    world. If you do not have Adobe Reader, you can download it free of charge from the
    Adobe web at <a href="http://www.adobe.com/products/acrobat/readstep2.html">http://www.adobe.com/products/acrobat/readstep2.html</a>. If you have an
    old version of Adobe Reader, you may need to upgrade your software.

#### Definitions: 'Minorities' and 'indigenous peoples'

The term 'minority' as used in the United Nations human rights system refers to national or ethnic, religious and linguistic minorities as laid out in the United Nations Declaration on the rights of persons belonging to national or ethnic, religious and linguistic minorities (General Assembly resolution 47/135 of 18 December 1992) and in Article 27 of the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights.

This Declaration also applies to **indigenous peoples**, in addition to the United Nations Declaration on the rights of indigenous peoples (General Assembly resolution A/61/L.67 of 13 September 2007) which articulates its provisions around **specific characteristics that indigenous peoples share around the world:** 

- a special relationship to lands and the environment;
- distinct political and social institutions, including customary legal systems and laws, cultural traditions and customs, health practices
- own understanding/perspective of development priorities, and traditional management of resources and other knowledge

Neither of the Declarations defines who minorities or indigenous peoples are, as no single definition could encapsulate the realities of all the diverse groups and communities concerned. Instead the United Nations takes into account the **principle of self-identification** when working with indigenous peoples and minorities.

It is now commonly accepted that recognition of minority status should be based on:

- objective criteria (such as non-dominance in terms of numbers and/or political power and possessing distinct ethnic, cultural, religious or linguistic characteristics) as well as on
- **subjective criteria of self-definition** (i.e. a will on the part of the members of the group in question to preserve these distinct characteristics).

It is suggested that the same principle should be used for the purposes of this questionnaire.
