Parliaments take action on violence against women and girls

IPU strategy

- Focuses on all forms of violence against women and girls at the international, regional and national levels
- Includes men and women parliamentarians
- Builds on parliaments' and parliamentarians' political leadership and ability to drive change
- Aims to respond to the particular concerns and needs of parliaments and parliamentarians



Three target areas

- Building a strong and effective legal framework
- Securing effective implementation
- Reinforcing prevention and transformation





Lessons learned

Lesson 1: Legislation and policy making are at the heart of parliamentary action

As legislators, what parliamentarians can do?

- Identify and eliminate discriminatory provisions in existing laws and policies
- Review, strengthen and develop legislation and policies on all forms of violence against women and girls
- Follow a comprehensive approach based on international standards
- Develop a consultative process (public consultations and advocacy centred on legislative agendas)
- Build your capacity in reviewing and drafting legislation on violence against women and girls

Lesson 2: Empowered parliaments and parliamentarians = effective actions on VAWG

How?

- Access to expertise and tools to support action by parliaments
- Peer-to-peer engagement, exchange and learning at the regional and global level
- Mentorship and solidarity
 between parliamentarians,
 especially between men and
 women

Lesson 3: A conducive environment facilitates parliament's action on VAWG

How?

- Building partnerships and alliances
 - engagement with citizens, ministries, civil society, women's organizations and other partners
 - cross-party alliances among parliamentarians
- Building political momentum and national engagement



Lesson 4: Implementation of laws and policies remains the main challenge

How can parliamentarians strengthen that?

- Budgeting to ensure adequate funding and long-term sustainability of programmes
- Including enforcement mechanisms in legislation and using their good offices to involve all those concerned
- Requesting regular research on the prevalence, causes and consequences of various forms of violence against women
- Regular monitoring of the implementation of legislation and policies, and assessing their impact
- Visibility and communication around legislation



Lesson 5: One cannot prevent VAWG without addressing gender inequality

How can parliamentarians strengthen that?

- Promoting respect for women and girls' rights and their empowerment
- Creating an environment conducive for gender equality
- Working on changing social and cultural norms and attitudes
- Engaging men and boys in preventing and ending violence against women and girls
- Participating in media campaigns and raising awareness
